Like other books in the International Library, the text is intended primarily for***

***reference by those who need to reflect upon what criminology has had to say about important, contemporary concerns of criminal policy. The papers present a kind of history of ideas which together trace the emergence of some key components of contemporary thinking about reducing crime. Lord Arthur Savile is introduced by Lady Windermere to her chiromantist, Mr Podgers. Although doubtful about Podgers' ability, Savile is intrigued. Hard pressed by Savile, Podgers reads his palms and reveals to him he will commit a murder. But Lord Savile is in love with his fiancée, Sybil Merton. Now obsessed with the revelation, he is concerned he might murder her. In order to avoid killing the woman he loves, he finds a solution: killing someone else. It is the only way he will then fulfil the prophecy and therefore protect his future. First he postpones his marriage and plans to kill his aunt Clementina, who is quite old and suffers from heartburn. He gives her a little silver bonbonnière containing a capsule of an efficient poison known as aconitine. He reads about his aunt's death when in Venice, and is suddenly relieved. He later finds out she has not touched the capsule, meaning she died of natural death after all and that consequently he is not the murderer. He***

***postpones his marriage with Sybil a second time. Disappointed with his unsuccessful first attempt at murder, he places his hopes in the person of the Dean of Chichester, distant family relative. He visits a German anarchist and obtains an explosive clock, which he then sends to his future victim. But the explosive clock does not explode. Rather it spends the day producing harmless explosions, much to the amusement of the family, for whom this toy is the next new thing. Disappointed, depressed, Lord Savile wanders aimlessly in London when he meets the chiromantist on a bridge over the river Thames. Lord Savile has a brilliant idea. Without hesitation, he grabs the man and throws him into the Thames, and goes away. The reader is then led to believe the chiromantist might have been a liar; regardless, Lord Savile lives happily ever after. "And I? May I say nothing, my lord?" With these words, Oscar Wilde's courtroom trials came to a close. The lord in question, High Court justice Sir Alfred Wills, sent Wilde to the cells, sentenced to two years in prison with hard labor for the crime of "gross indecency" with other men. As cries of "shame" emanated from the gallery, the convicted aesthete was roundly silenced. But he did not remain so. Behind bars and in the***

***period immediately after his release, Wilde wrote two of his most powerful works--the long autobiographical letter De Profundis and an expansive best-selling poem, The Ballad of Reading Gaol. In The Annotated Prison Writings of Oscar Wilde, Nicholas Frankel collects these and other prison writings, accompanied by historical illustrations and his rich facing-page annotations. As Frankel shows, Wilde experienced prison conditions designed to break even the toughest spirit, and yet his writings from this period display an imaginative and verbal brilliance left largely intact. Wilde also remained politically steadfast, determined that his writings should inspire improvements to Victorian England's grotesque regimes of punishment. But while his reformist impulse spoke to his moment, Wilde also wrote for eternity.
